Holding Space for Others

Recently, I listened to a guided meditation by Tamara Levitt, in which she discussed the importance of "holding space" for others. By this she meant creating a safe space for another person to feel and process whatever emotion they may be currently experiencing, particularly sentiments such as sorrow, grief, and anxiety. All too often, when someone we care about is feeling sad, we rush in with pep talks and solutions and we neglect to actually listen to that person. Even worse, sometimes in our hurry to make things better, we minimize what our loved one is feeling. Levitt's reminder was that sometimes the best thing we can do for a person who is hurting is to just sit with them, listen, and give them the space they need to explore their experience.

In one of my favorite scriptures - the Walk to Emmaus in Luke 24:13-35 - Jesus does just that. In this story, Jesus has risen from the dead only earlier that morning, but his disciples do not yet know that. Two of the disciples are walking to the village of Emmaus and are distraught over Jesus' death. Jesus meets them on the road, but they are unable to recognize him. He asks them what they are discussing and Cleopas answers, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?"

I love Jesus' response. He asks them, "What things?" Jesus knows better than anyone what "things" have happened - after all, they happened to him! But, Jesus, instead of rushing to reassure the disciples or to make everything better, gives the disciples the space they need to process and share their experience and feelings. They tell him about Jesus' mighty works, about his unjust and brutal death, that there are rumors of an empty tomb, that they don't know what to believe. They share all they have been through and the confusion and grief they have felt.

Something interesting has happened during this conversation. We

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are told that when Jesus first asks the disciples what they are discussing, "They stood still, looking sad." They stopped moving forward - physically as well as emotionally. They found themselves stuck. Yet, after Jesus creates space for them to share what they have been through, they begin to walk again, once again moving forward as they resume their journey to Emmaus, where they will recognize Jesus, and then, overcome with joy, will rush back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples they have seen their Lord. They go from standing still, to moving forward, to rushing with excitement to share the good news and move into a new space, a new chapter.

How might we practice holding space for others? This will be especially important as we begin the work of moving forward into a new chapter. We will have much to process. We will have a wide variety of emotions - relief, grief, anxiety, hope, and more. So, how might we as the Body of Christ, hold space for another to share and process our experiences of this past year?

It takes courage to listen, especially when someone we care about shares feelings of grief and anxiety. It takes patience to ask someone, "what things" they've experienced and to truly hear their response, especially when we think we already know the answer. It takes a willingness to share our time and to give a person other than ourselves our complete attention. It takes vulnerability. It takes love.



After the disciples have their space to process and share what they've experienced, they begin to move forward again. And then, when they recognize Jesus' presence among them, they rush to Jerusalem to share the good news and begin a new chapter together. This new life won't look like the old one. But they have seen the Lord. They know he is present with them. And they know what we can also be sure of: Jesus holds space for us, just as he did for the disciples, so that we can share our feelings, experiences, and our very lives with him.
